UN PAINTING YOUR PLASTIC MODELS BY IAN ALCE

There are several ways to UN-paint your models, and whilst they are all very effective, some can also remove the model to that happy train land in the big blue yonder.

These over-effective methods include - .

- 1 Letting your one-year-old remove the paint with his teeth.
- 2 Using a blow-torch or similar heating source.
- 3 · A 4" flat file.
- 4 Soaking it in Nitric, Chloric or similar acids.

Now that all the main No-No's are out of the road, there is one RELATIVELY SAFE way of doing it - BRAKE FLUID.

Unless you model in the land of the giants (S & O gauges), a one litre bottle will be more than enough. You will also need a large jar with a plastic lid, that can be securely screwed tight, and an old tooth brush. Make sure that you keep all this equipment away from children and foodstuffs.

A few words of WARNING - firstly; certain models do not take too kindly to the use of brake fluid for lengthy periods of immersion. Body shells of Rivarossi steam locomotives are a problem as the smokebox is a softer plastic separate moulding to the main boiler. Be careful with this type of plastic.

The best way to test the plastic is to put one drop of fluid on the inside of the model and see what happens after about 10-15 minutes. If the plastic has shown no signs of softening or bubbling then it should be okay to procede with the operation.

Sometimes, if you leave the model in the fluid for too long, it could be a milky white in colour when you wash the fluid off. Nothing can be done about this, except not to do the same operation next time.

PROCEDURE

- 1 Take brake fluid and carefully pour contents into a large jar.
- 2 Place car or small structure into the jar full of fluid and screw the lid on securely. If the body is on a motorised unit, then remove the body shell from the motorised chassis first, before placing it in the fluid. DO NOT place plastic bogies into the fluid, as the fluid will effect the metal axles. If the model is too big for the jar, then use a larger jar or a plastic container that can have a lid securely fitted to it.
- 3 Now, you can give the jar and contents a good shaking for a minute or two, and then stand the model on the bench for about five minutes.

4 Now repeat the above point (3).

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Many Model Railroaders get as big a bang out of swapping model railroad passes as they do in building or running their railroad. Host model passes are attractively printed by professionals, some more attractive than others, but all interesting.

Since the beginning of transportation, railroads and other transportation companies have recognized and honoured their fellow officials by exchanging passes on their respective systems. A pass is simply an order to the conductor to allow free passage to the holder. It usually has restrictions and conditions stated on its face or back. With model railroaders, passes are now exchanged by the thousands and their listings can be found in the BULLETIN, Model Railroad Craftsman and Pass Swappers catalogues.

I have been Pass Swapping for over a year now and todate have a collection of over 100 passes from model railroaders all around the world. Originally I only intended to swap passes for the fun of looking at other railroaders' passes, but it has grown beyond this and I have made some really firm and friendly relationships with other modellers in other parts of the world. In fact two of the friendships have developed in such a way that I have joined another world-wide organisation that allows me to further express my modelling aspirations in model trains. This would not have occurred if I had not taken up the fun hobby of pass swapping. A copy of one of my passes can be seen on the back page of the Walthers Catalogue for 1984.

To start the ball rolling, I have noted below a couple of Australasian Railroad Modellers who swap passes -

- 5 After a further five minutes, repeat point 3, EXCEPT that when you have finished "shaking" the model, take it out of the fluid and give it a hard scrub with the tooth brush. Then rinse the model in cold water and stand it aside to thoroughly dry.
- 6 By now all the paint should be removed from your model. If not then you try the method once more, using the tooth brush again.

Now you are ready to paint your model to your heart's delight and painting techniques can be gleaned from numerous book and magazine articles.**





USA VISIT BY CHRIS HITCHINS.*

The Region now boasts a 'foreign' member, namely Chris Hitchins, who some of you will remember was one of the Region's original members of the forming committee. Chris has been transferred to Hong Kong for a period of time, in the line of duty. He recently spent a couple of days back in Sydney and some of us were lucky enough to view some tapes he made whilst on a trip to the USA and Canada in May this year. Chris took shots of model railroad layouts at conventions, club layouts and private layouts, besides taking some very professional shots of the prototype railroads in both countries.

Chris visited the first PCR Convention which was held at VAllejo ME of San Francisco, where it was housed in a very spacious area. During the first day clinics were held and these covered a large range of items. That night a tour was made of the local layouts and Chris got the impression that most modellers spent their time and effort on club layouts in the area, eg Walnut Creek, Napa Valley.

The next day saw a bus load of camera laden fans travel to SP's Sacramento Workshops which still has many of the original steam era buildings. The site was developed in 1863 as the Sacramento General Shops of Central Pacific Co, employing 30 men. By 1922, 3100 employees in 18 shops and 5 departments repaired 400 locos, 624 coaches and 15 000 freight cars. Up to this time 52 locos and 2 750 freight cars had been built. Today the shops are more concentrated, in the works undertaken. Some 1 100 personnel are involved in 61 GRIP, 9 TEBU and 117 M-30 rebuilds. What's that you ask?

GRIP - General Rehabilitation Improvement Programme, is a complete rebuild of old locos, mostly SD 40's and SD 45's.

TEBU - Tractive Effort Booster Unit - basically 'slugs'.

M-30 - This is the general rebuild of SD 45's after 3 years or 250 000 mile service.

The next day saw Chris at the Napa Valley Model Railroad Club. A well developed HO layout in three Nissan huts built together to form a large 'U'. The following day at the Convention was a repeat of the clinics and other goodies, and for sale was a 5-inch live steam 3-truck Shay, for \$10 000. Chris didn't buy it though - he'd forgotten his VISA Card.

The concluding event was the Banquet - a beans and steak BBQ. When the Convention was finished, Chris then headed north and eventually stopped at McCloud River Railroad, which is a modern day timber orientated railroad using four GP 30's.

Whilst Chris was in Washington, he visited the Mt Rainer Scenic Railroad and had an enjoyable close encounter on a Heisler for a 7 mile trip. Chris showed us tapes on this episode and in one place Chris nearly fell of the footplate of the loco as it was crossing over a trestle, but he managed to survive the trip. At Seattle an inspection was made of an 18-stall roundhouse and loco servicing facility for SD 40 and 45's and F 40's. After this it was on to Canada chasing CP and CN trains up the Fraser Gorge, which has one track on each side of the gorge. Even on Sundays there is about one train per hour, mostly unit coal trains plus sulphur and wheat trains going to Vancover. Chris ended up in the Rocky Mountains at the spiral tunnel and here he watched the locos passing over their own caboose. Normally 4 or 5 SD 40's or 45's are at the head-end with a couple of remotes near the middle.

Chris finally returned to Vancover, filmed some RDC's of British Columbia Railway and on the final day rode behind the Royal Hudson up the side of the Sound, to Squamish, and return. He then travelled by car (by car?) to Truckee to see the Donner Pass in action and paid a visit to the Walnut Creek Model Railroad Club layout (see Model Railroader, March '84).

Our thanks to Chris for letting us know what is happening in the USA and hopefully we will have more news at a later date.**
