












I went along to the "Extra" meeting held by Warren Wormald on the ninth of January at his home in Schofields. And it was a very interesting afternoon. Warren's layout though small, 8'x4', none the less had many interesting features. A single track loop around with a reversing section through the middle and a passing track and several spurs make for versatile operation. Warren has used many small structures both scratch built and kit built with more to come. The integration of the roadways and trackwork was a good reminder that trains do not exist in isolation and without roads we would have no reason to run trains. The scenery, though only about half completed, worked well and the whole layout can be incorporated into a larger one later. The slide-out control panel triggered lots of interest and I am thinking how I can use the idea on my own layout. Videos and slides rounded out the afternoon. Afternoon tea was prepared by Warren's sister.

The point of incorporating a layout report into my presidential ramblings is that if you don't feel up to a "Full Meeting" at your place, maybe try Warren's approach and hold a small "Extra" meeting just to get the feel of it. Thank you Warren for being involved and getting into it.

We need more venues for meetings in the latter half of this year. You will note in the meeting schedule a blank for Sydney this July. Please contact Glen Coventry if you have a suitable venue for July or later and if you are in one of the other divisions and would like a meeting at your place, contact your Divisional Superintendent in your state. Their names and numbers are inside the front cover of Main Line. The more you are involved the more fun it is.

A point raised at Warren's by one of our members is worth discussing. Why do we invite Non Members to our conventions and not charge them extra? Good question.

The convention committee grapples with this one

every time we plan a convention and on the face of it, it does seem unfair. Our reason is simple. Non members attending our conventions do not usually remain non members for long. A very large percentage like what they see and sign up on the day or within a few weeks. The last major convention resulted in over 35 new members. By not charging a premium we help maintain and increase our membership. The conventions are our most effective method of recruiting new members, and without new members we stagnate.

At the Board of Directors meeting on February 1st the question of our membership fees was raised by treasurer Andrew Wells. As we all know the Australian Dollar is not the flavour of the month with overseas money markets and they have seriously devalued our currency over the last year by well over 12%. As most of our members in Australia renew their US membership through the local branch we have been sustaining a loss on the exchange rate. Our fees have not changed for several years. In addition production costs on our magazine continue to creep up and the cost per year for the four magazines is more than the \$11.00 membership fee. The production quality of Main Line has improved dramatically. Postal charges are set to increase 35-80% as the concession rate for registered publications is phased out over the next year and Print Post is introduced. The committee therefore has had no choice but to increase the membership charges to more accurately reflect our costs Combined membership for both the US and Australia will rise from A\$44.00 to A\$50.00. Membership of the Australian region rises from A\$11.00 to A\$14.00. The complete list is elsewhere in the magazine. The good news is that family membership remains the same at A\$7.00.

In this issue we have included a book of raffle tickets to all members. These are only activated when returned prior to the drawing, the prize being a trip to the US National Convention in 1993 or 1994 up to \$2000.00 worth. I hope you all accept these in the spirit in which they are offered, that is to give all members an equal opportunity to attend a US National Convention.

An enjoyable day was had by all. Thanks to all at Marybourough.





The attendees at these inspections will have in excess of 60 minutes to examine, video, photograph the layout, and quiz the owner on those special points of interest and gain valuable knowledge for their own model empire. GUEST PRESENTER - - Tony Koester, President of the Allegheny Midland

***A Closer Look At Aspects Of The Allegheny Midland ***

Tony's major clinic will feature a range of all new photographs never seen before. This clinic will range across subjects such as Structures, Construction, Kitbashing and operation on the A.M. This clinic will be a full 1 hour on the Saturday and Sunday. This allows you to attend the Inspections on the Saturday and still see Tony in action!!

Tony has also agreed to conduct a "Trains Of Thought" discussion group on the Saturday Afternoon. This will be an informal lecture by Tony about the benefits and philosophy of operation of a model railroad. A question and answer session will be at the end and will range across all aspects of the hobby and Tony's philosophy". This should not be missed by anyone who is wishing to lift his Model Railroad into the real world. Tony is hoping to bring some of the first copies of Allan Keller"s video session with him - with luck we might be the first to see this program.

INSPECTIONS

As outlined, the inspections are really "on site" clinics with sufficient time to allow the visitor to examine and discuss the concepts used by the owner in the creation of his empire. They are intended to be an educational tool as are the clinics provided at the convention centre.

Phil Moore - Santa Fe Class 1 Main Line

Located in Cajon Pass, this layout has continued to advance since its debut at the 1991 Convention. Phil's layout is true Class 1 with trackage and scenery that capture the drama of the Santa Fe operation through Cajon Pass. This layout features the use of new and innovative materials and techniques that have been used to create the semi arid conditions of the California landscape.

The layout is also of interest due to its use of command control and computer dispatching C.T.C. panels and extensive use of layover tracks. Of course don't miss Phil's clinic on the Saturday on how he created the scenery.

Gary Norwood - Rio Grande Southern (circa 1940)

Through his extensive research of the RGS, Gary has recreated Placerville, Vance Junction, Ophir Loop and the Summit on his layout. Gary's depth of knowledge of the RGS is unique and has been combined with skills as a prize winning model builder to create a totally accurate models of the selected areas. Gary's skills as an instrument fitter have been used to completely rebuild the locomotives to ensure their smooth operation and accuracy in appearance for the 1940's time frame he is modelling. This layout would be of interest to anyone contemplating construction of a model of the RGS in any time frame. This inspection will provide valuable insights into how to construct and source information - a must for all dedicated prototype modellers.

Geoff Nott - White Pass & Cowlitz (Freelance)

Geoff's layout is famous for its towering mountains and magnificent scenery. The layout features the use of natural and commercial products combined in such a way as to create scenery that has no equal. The layout has recently undergone simplification of the track work and a complete rebuilding incorporating the new "Real Rock" scenery developed and outlined at the 1992 convention. By the way, did we mention the equipment and rolling stock? They blend with the scenery to create a seamless vista that will leave you wondering if you have been looking at the real thing!

ACCOMMODATION.

The closest motel is the **Best Western**, Parramatta City Motel situated on the Western Highway, just 1.2 KM from our venue. Normal rates per night are \$69.00 single, \$79.00 double and \$85.00 treble (One double and one single bed). The Photo Contest

There are 4 categories in our photo contest, judged according to the NMRA guidelines

Model

- 1.11 Black and White Print
- 1.12 Colour Print

Prototype Subject

- 1.21 Black and White Print
- 1.22 Colour Print

The NMRA judging guidelines and scoring are based on the following;

A. SUBJECT MATTER

The visual impact of the shot, up to 20 points.

B. DIFFICULTY

A realist photograph of a model is more difficult than a simple prototype and should score better, up to **20 points**.

C. COMPOSITION

Visual arrangement of forms within the picture must be pleasing, up to 20 points.

D. ARTISTIC APPROACH

Visual effects used to enhance the artistic or creative impact of the shot, up to 20 points.

E. FINISHING AND TECHNIQUE

Is the image correctly printed, spotted and mounted etc. up to 20 points.

A few hints to help you maximise your score. The minimum print size is 6 x 4 and it will have more impact if it is larger. Prints must be mounted if you want to win. A simple card mounting board will suffice. You will loose marks for not mounting and presenting your work to the best possible standard. Model photography gains points in scoring against prototype as it is much more difficult to do. This will only matter when Best in Show is close. Each category is judged on its own merits. Indicate if you made the prints yourself or if a commercial lab made them, it is only right you should gain extra points for scratch building the print! We do not accept transparencies because it is to hard to display them adequately. Last of all don't be put off from entering your shots. Have a Go!

The Model Contest

There are presently eleven (11) categories for models in NMRA contests, in both Modellers and Masters section. Masters are those modellers who have earned more than 87.5pts in that category in a previous contest. In brief, these categories are:

- 1 Locomotives Steam
- 2 Locomotives Diesel and other
- 3 Passenger Cars
- 4 Freight Cars
- 5 Cabooses
- 6 Non revenue cars, Maintenance of way cars The above categories are hopfully self explanitary.

If any of the above are presented on track or any form of presentation then they are considered to be a Display / Diorama.

7 Structures - On Line

Structures that are owned by the railroad. No base or form of scenery is required.

8 Structures - Off Line

Structures that are not owned by the railroad e.g. school, bus stop, cafe, pig pen.

9 Displays or Dioramas

A building or group of buildings, a section of scenery, with or without track, i.e. a typical / non-typical scene that can be part of a model railroad.

10 Traction

The same as for categories 2-6.

11 Modules

The same as 9 except that it is operational on its own or as part of a layout.

(Structures On and Off Line count as one category in determining eligibility to enter Modellers Contest.)

Each model is judged against a score sheet NOT against another model. The score sheet is made up of 5 sections:

- 1 Construction (Maximum of 40 points)
 (Quality of construction)
- Detail (Maximum of 25 points)
- Conformity (Maximum of 10 Points)
 Finish & Lettering (Maximum of 25 Points)
- 5 Scratchbuilt (Maximum of 25 Points)
 (Quantity of scratchbuilding)

If you have entered a model in a previous contest, you may enter the same model again provided the that it did not win 1st place at that contest.

Model Contest and Achievement Program Tips by Fred Gill MMR

The purpose of this article is to help those modellers who will be entering the model contests at the forthcoming Convention '93. Some members may not be aware that they can obtain Merit Awards in the Achievement Program by entering their models in the Model Contests. If a model achieves $87^{1}/_{2}$ points in a contest then that model is eligible for an AP Merit Award and this could then be the beginning of accumulating points towards the Achievement Certificate.

This year, judging at the Regional Convention will be on sectional judging. In this case a team of judges (at least two individuals) will be assigned to one of the five sections to be judged, i.e., Construction, Detail, Conformity, Finish/Lettering and Scratchbuilt. This team of two will then judge only that section in all the categories.

The Model Contest Entry Form (No. 902) and the manner in which you complete it is particularly important. This will be explained in more detail further along.

It is a sad but true fact that many modellers will spend weeks or months building a model, then put it into the contest with an entry form picked up in the contest room at the last minute and filled out in haste. The judges are not clairvoyant and the only way that they can determine how the model was built, and in what manner, is by the way you describe it on the entry form. If it is at all possible you should endeavour to obtain your Model Contest entry forms as far in advance as possible. Contest Entry forms can be obtained from the Contest Chairman - Gerry Hopkins MMR, 7 Booralie Road, Terrey Hills NSW 2084, whilst AP regulations can be obtained from Fred Gill MMR, P.O. Box 155, Baulkham Hills NSW 2153. Secondly, if possible the forms should be typed, but if that is not possible then PRINT the information legibly in ink, NOT pencil. By filling out your entry form well in advance of the contest, you can sit down quietly, without pressure, review what you want to tell the judges, then make a rough draft and read it over, correct it if necessary and when it suits you the complete the entry form.

Keep your explanations short and clear, as your intention is to simply inform the judges what you did and how you did it. You are not confined to the space allocated for each section and it may be wise to use a separate sheet of paper for a particular section. If you do this, mark " see attached sheet " in the space for that section and be sure to mark the separate sheet/s with the section heading (scratchbuilding, detail, etc.) and your name.

Supplementary material, such as photographs, diagrams and plans can be very helpful to the judges. If you do submit such material, don't put 5-10 additional sheets into your write up. If you have use an erection drawing or a large plan, try and have duplicated and reduced to a manageable size.

The detail section of the entry form calls for a list of all commercial parts used, so if none were used then record this on the form as NONE or NIL. It makes it easier for the judges when they are allocating points to the model.

The scratchbuilt section calls for a list also, so you should complete it as described above in the detail section. It is in the Scratchbuilt section more than any other section that judging is of a quantative nature. The more you scratchbuild, the more points you may reasonably expect to gain. Make your list as complete as possible and say what you have to say, remember KISS (keep it short and simple). If you started with a NWSL 4-4-0, say so and don't tell the judges the story that the model is constructed of entirely of brass sheet and castings etc.

Make your sentences count, if you kitbash you model, tell it like it is. If you scratchbuilt a portion and kitbashed the rest, then spell it out that way. Do it in the beginning of your construction narrative so that what follows is that much easier to be understood by the judges.

If a certain part of your model construction falls into one or more of the contest sections, be sure to mention it in each section. As an example, suppose you have working doors and windows on your model, under construction you should describe the manner in which you made them operable. Under the detail section you should mention the fact that they operate, after all, that's an important part of detailing. Under conformity it should be again mentioned, as operating doors/windows certainly conform more than non-operating ones. Finally, you could mention the operating fact under scratchbuilt as if any of the operating parts were scratchbuilt, points would be awarded.

In summary, the name of the game is points. The more points you earn the better your model will score. So don't handicap it by a sloppy, poorly filled out entry form. Give the judges the information that they need to know. Do it as clearly, legibly and succinctly as you can. If you have supplimentary information, keep it to a reasonable amount and in an easily handled form.

Firstly - Happy New Year to you. Well things are starting to roll. Ron Cooper from Collaroy has asked for information on Building a Spiral in "HO" scale (std. gauge). Ron can't find information on this and doesn't want to waste time experimenting. Assistance would be appreciated from those who have successfully built or who have data on spirals. The spiral will form part of the mainline and Ron plans to run long wheel base steam locos. Ron's phone number is 982 1147.

Bob Nelson, Superintendent Div 4 has written and is happy to take care of member aid assistance himself, however, it's here we should all be able to help any member if or where information and assistance is required. Bob mentions he has had a query on parts for a Roundhouse Loco Kit from a member in Darwin - and a query from a father looking for suitable equipment for a 4 year old son and a couple of other interesting one's!

One good point about our association is that longtime model R.R'ers store old kit plans and such and of course there's bound to be a time when you have a kit or like without plans. So this column and your local model R.R agent can help you get more enjoyment and satisfaction by using the network which stretches from Perth to New Zealand and would have to cover every (normal) scale!

D.R. McAdam of Port Ohope, New Zealand. recently purcased a set of articulated piggyback cars and the truck trailer to use with them at his container depot. The trailers are loaded onto the train with an overhead crane mounted on large tyres and straddles the track. Would any one with photos or plans who could help him build this crane please contact me.

Looking forward to meeting you at what's lining up to be one hell of a convention, and remember, if you're having modelling problems - ask your "local bloke" first and if still having problems then share them through this column.



Little by little information comes in and the lastest was in the form of some colour photographs that Mick O'Hannlan took when he was over at the convention last year. The shots were of main street buildings (hotels) and support other photo's that Geoff Willett has loaned me thanks fellas.

This issue shows some techniques and sketches I use and can be of benefit to you. There's nothing worse than seeing a structure not "sitting" right on a layout looking like it's just been dropped there and sitting on uneven and unsceniced land. Also, it's frustrating building plastics kits only to find warped or uneven joining edges that leave gaps and therefore lead to dissatisfaction. So here's some helpful tips on sorting out the problems and solving them, from the ground up!


- 1) Use a thick cut out paper which the same as the floor plan of the structure and place this on the layout. This will give you a very good idea before you build and find it won't fit. It also allows you to see the undulations of the land form and you can mark out for foundations - a little item very often overlooked.
- 2) Foundations are easy and for model purposes cheap to construct :-

Firstly: Wooden piers can be made from matchsticks. On the line drawn on the layout drill holes to snugly take the match piers equally distanced and having one on each corner. Using a small level place it atop os a row and gently push down. Continue to do this on all rows until it's where civil engineering practice would have it (if it looks right it is right rule). A small amount of glue can be put onto some or all of the piers t hold. Before putting the structure on top you may wish to put diagonal wood braces on the side (ref: fig 1).



Secondly: Brick or stone foundations will look better if they are sunken into the landscape (ref fig 2) this type can be "cut to suit" or by

chiselling into the scenery and later applying scenic material. If you are building a wooden structure on top of the brick\stone foundation then any size stonework will do. However, if you are building bricks on top then the foundation work should be of a larger size so that it complements the structure.

Figure 3: Shows simple extra details like basement doors. Also you can add ventilators, pluming, drains, electrical connection\fuse boxes and other such items depending on foundation height.






Figure 4: Shows how I make my downpipes from round and square styrene or wire. Thin paper strips are cut with a sharp knife and super glued on about ever 4 scale feet.
